# **Bald Hill taken to the next level**



Have you climbed the new steps at Bald Hill yet? Stage 1 of the Bald Hill Activation, the "Bacchus Marsh 1000+ Steps", was officially opened a few weeks ago by Minister for Tourism, Sport and Major Events The Hon Martin Pakula.

While he was there, he announced \$2.1 million in funding from the Regional Tourism Investment Fund for stage 3 of the project, which will include:

- An all-abilities trail at the summit, designed to capture 360 degree views across Moorabool and back towards Melbourne.
- Six thematically designed sculptures, which will be located along the trail and provide a link to the sculpture trail at the base of the 1000+ Steps at Telford Park.
- A car park constructed off Swans Road.

Summit amenities will include a trail, shelter, tables, seating, wayfinding, interpretive signage and accessible toilets.

Mayor Cr Tom Sullivan said connection to the 1000+ Steps will give visitors the opportunity to start their journey at either Telford Park or the summit where they will be rewarded with impressive views.

"This is a fantastic project for our region, one that will substantially increase tourism in this area, and we thank the State Government for recognising and investing in that," Cr Sullivan said.

The total project cost for stage 3 is \$2.8 million, with Council funding around \$700,000.

Construction will commence shortly at Bald Hill Activation Stage 2, the Telford Park redevelopment, that includes an all abilities trail, sculpture and car park (connecting with the 1000+ Steps).





As part of its transition out of direct service delivery roles in aged and disability services, Council is pleased to have been informed of the appointment of two

new providers to service delivery in Moorabool community. Silver Chain Victoria has been appointed by the Commonwealth Government to provide aged care services to residents over 65 years of age and Mecwacare has been appointed by the State Government to provide care for Council's clients aged under 65 living with a disability. Silver Chain will take on approximately 700 clients, while Mecwacare will transition approximately 40 clients.

Council is working closely with Silver Chain and Mecwacare to ensure the transition is as smooth as possible for all clients.

The appointment of new service providers to Moorabool has occurred as a result of Council's confirmed decision to cease delivering aged and disability services to Moorabool residents from 1 July this year.

A change in Federal Government policy arising from the Royal Commission into Aged Care made it clear that local government does not have a meaningful role to play in the future delivery of aged care services and this is demonstrated in other Council's throughout Victoria also making the

"Although local government will no longer be delivering these services, our priority is making sure those in our community who accessed these services continue to receive a very high standard of care," Moorabool Mayor Cr Tom Sullivan said.

"Council has worked very closely with clients and staff throughout this whole process – they have been the priority – and we will continue to ensure open and transparent communication and a smooth transition for clients and staff.

"Once service delivery ceases. Council will continue to have dedicated resources within the organisation, to provide support and information to the local community to ensure service referrals and links to relevant services occur and to help the community navigate the aged care and disability systems," Cr Sullivan said.

# State commits to pool, hope for Feds to follow

Mayor Cr Tom Sullivan and Councillors Moira Berry, Tonia Dudzik and Ally Munari were on site to welcome a significant funding announcement made by Premier Daniel Andrews recently.

The Premier visited the Moorabool Aquatic and Recreation Centre site and announced the State Government would contribute \$10 million towards the indoor aquatic centre.

The funds are added to Council's own commitment of \$15 million towards the project. The missing piece of the puzzle is funding from the Federal Government.

Council wrote to all candidates in the lead up to the Federal election asking them to commit to the pool. Now, with the Albanese Government and his Cabinet sworn in, we will continue advocating for this and other local infrastructure and services.

"We have congratulated our local MPs Catherine King and Sam Rae on their election success ad written to the new Ministers in the Albanese Government," Cr Sullivan said.

"We look forward to working closely with them to achieve great outcomes for our communities, and have sent them our advocacy prospectus so they know what is important to us."

# Council's tree planting initiative is growing strong

One of the things that makes Moorabool so appealing as a place to live and work are the beautiful, plentiful trees.

Each year, Council commits \$100k to plant, manage and maintain over 18,000 trees across Moorabool's rural and urban landscapes. With Council's ongoing planting initiatives, together with wonderful community support, the number and variety of trees in Moorabool Shire continues to increase.

This year, Council's tree planting initiative focussed on Brady's Lane Greendale, Jonathan Drive Darley, the replacement of vandalised trees in Bungaree, and the continuation of the nature strip tree replacement

Council's Parks & Gardens team place high importance on choosing the right species of tree for each location and carefully considers environmental conditions, including climate, soil conditions and the look, feel and health of

Mayor Cr Tom Sullivan said we were lucky in Moorabool to be surrounded by nature, including such a bounty of fantastic trees.

"Our trees are one of Moorabool's greatest assets," Cr Sullivan said.

"They are loved by everyone in all their different sizes, colours, shapes and varieties. Council is committed to planting more trees each year and for caring for our existing trees."

# **Parks Nearly Ready** for Action

Get ready skaters, bike riders and basketballers! The redevelopments at Mill Park Recreation Reserve in Ballan and Gordon Public Park are nearing completion.

Mill Park is having a skate park, pump track and a 3x3m basketball practice court & ring installed, while Gordon will be home to a skate park and 3x3m basketball practice court and ring.

Car parking, pedestrian access and landscaping complete the projects. The projects are expected to be completed in the next few months.

## Reserve expanding as work continues

Bacchus Marsh Racecourse Recreation Reserve is still a hive of activity in the development space, with the completion of multi-use tennis and netball courts, and work underway on sports field lighting, car parks, landscaping and getting an area ready for an oval and multi-use playing field.



### **Asset Management Strategy and Plan Adopted**

Council is responsible for the management and maintenance of more than \$700-million worth of infrastructure assets including the local road and path network, underground drainage, bridges, buildings and facilities, parks and recreational facilities. We are responsible for the effective management of these infrastructure assets to meet current and future needs of our community.

The Asset Management Strategy sets out the framework to assist Council to deliver sustainable and effective asset management services, whilst the Asset Management Plans set out the general principles of life cycle asset management for each of the major asset groups (Transport, Buildings, Open Space and Stormwater).

A review of the existing Strategy and Plans was undertaken, and updates were recommended based on current standards and guidelines, new asset data, expected growth, professional experience, and utilisation of predictive modelling tools.

Following a public exhibition period, the updated Asset Management Strategy and Asset Management Plans were adopted by Council at the June Ordinary Meeting. Copies of these documents are available on our website.






#### Guide to what's ok on your nature strip

A nature strip is the portion of land located within the road reserve, between a property boundary and the adjacent roadway. Nature strips add to the look of the local area and provide a space for assets such as footpaths, trees, street furniture and lights and utilities such as gas, water, telecommunications and electricity to be located.

A Naturestrip Policy and Guideline has been developed to provide residents with an overview of the responsibilities of both Council and the community, as well as information on renovation works which are permitted to be undertaken within the naturestrip



area and when a permit is required to be obtained. The documents apply to residential areas in Bacchus Marsh and Ballan.

The documents were developed following significant community consultation and a public exhibition period and were formally adopted by Council, to come into effect from 1 July 2022. # Launch of our touching storm recovery book

Moorabool's Storm Recovery Team launched a Storm Recovery book at two community get-togethers earlier this month, acknowledging one year since the June 2021 storm.

On Sunday 19 June 2022, storm impacted communities in Blackwood and surrounding towns attended a community catch up at the Blackwood Recreation Reserve, with representatives from emergency services and Council, to talk about their recovery journey one year since the major storm event that hit our Shire. Storm impacted communities in Korweinguboora and surrounds attended the same event on Sunday 26 June, 2022 at the Korweinguboora Recreation Reserve. Attendees at both events were able to catch up over a spit roast lunch, with face painting and activities for kids. Mayor of Moorabool Shire Council, Cr Tom Sullivan, officially launched the Storm Recovery book at midday, at both events. The book is a collection of community stories, interviews and photos, that documents Moorabool's experience on the night of the storm, and the recovery journey since. With over 1,000 properties impacted in our Shire, this book acknowledges the collective impact the storm had on our community, and how far we've come together since. Jointly funded by the Commonwealth and Victoria under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements, storm impacted residents

can collect a copy of the book for free. If you weren't able to attend the Blackwood and Korweinguboora events, you can pick one up from the Council office in Ballan.



# Storm recovery habitat kits a hit

Thanks to funding from the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning, Moorabool's Storm Recovery Team have been able to develop Storm Recovery Habitat Kits to assist Moorabool's natural environment to recover from the June 2021 storm.

These kits include up to 50 native plants, up to 10 tree saplings, a bee hotel and up to three nest boxes, for free. The nest boxes have been crafted from timber collected during the storm clean up, that was turned into useable wood at the Romsey green waste facility. A big thanks to the Ballan Men's Shed and the Rotary Club of Bacchus Marsh for building the boxes for this program. Thanks also to Rowsley Nursery for propagating the plants and saplings.

Moorabool's Storm Recovery Team will host a habitat and vegetation workshop alongside Landcare in early July, where eligible residents will be able to collect their kits and learn how to make best use of them.

Residents who applied for the kits were assessed for eligibility based on their area's level of storm impact. Many animals who rely on tree hollows lost their homes during the storm. Native species who were impacted in Moorabool include brush-tailed phascogales, greater gliders, powerful owls, barking owls and feather-tailed gliders. Residents with these animals in their area were also prioritised.

Thank you to everyone who registered for your contribution to rebuilding our natural environment.

# How to make a native solitary bee hotel

Moorabool's Storm Recovery team held two workshops in May to share details with residents about how to make a safe place for native, solitary bees to live as our environment continues to recover from the June 2021 storm.

So what exactly is a bee hotel?

There are over 1600 species of bee in Australia, and most of them are solitary. That means they don't live in hives but lay their eggs in small gaps in trees, reeds, and the ground. These bee hotels are made out of repurposed plastic bottles and hollow plant stems, giving native solitary bees a safe place to live. Native bees are extremely important to our ecosystem-they pollinate native plants, many of which can't be pollinated by introduced bees.



## Creativity and Imagination are thriving in Moorabool

What a year it has been for writing and stories right here in Moorabool!

In early June, the Moorabool community had the opportunity to come together to celebrate and recognise the talents of local primary and secondary school students in the 2022 Moorabool Young Writers Awards, and writers from across Australia in the 2022 Peter Carey Short Story Awards.

The Peter Carey award again received more than 300 entries country-wide and provided a tough-to-judge field.

After making changes to the Moorabool Young Writers Awards, by including a theme and more entry categories, our judges were blown away by the efforts and imaginations of the 735 entrants.

Darley Primary School submitted 430 entries and Bacchus Marsh Primary School nearly 200. Of the smaller schools in the Shire, Coimadai submitted 64 entries which is the vast majority of the student population, and St Patricks Primary in Gordon, and Balliang Primary School students also produced good numbers.
