In preparation for state and federal budgets in the first half of next year, Council has updated its advocacy prospectus with a range of new and existing projects which we will be advocating to other levels of government to fund.

From the list, we have selected a top 3 priority list for Victorian Government funding and a top 3 priority list for the Federal Government

The projects are:

State:

- Upgrade of Griffith Street, Bacchus Marsh, including expansion to
- Oval upgrades for the townships of Gordon, Ballan, Dunnstown and Wallace
- An athletics track at Mason's Lane Bacchus Marsh

Federal:

- An indoor pool at Bacchus Marsh
- Upgrade of Griffith Street, Bacchus Marsh, including expansion to four lanes and upgrades to the Western Freeway
- Upgrades to Lal Lal Reserve

As part of our campaign to advocate for funds for these projects, we invite the community to lobby their local Members of Parliament to join our voice.

Letters have been set up on our website that residents can sign and send to their local MPs - their contact details are also on our site.

Calling local artists!

The artist of the selected artwork will be notified in September 2024.



Playspace and ovals open, library hub progressing



A recent community celebration marked the opening of the all-abilities adventure playground at Bacchus Marsh Racecourse and Recreation Reserve (BMRRR). Kids enjoyed the playground facilities, which include:

- Two climbing towers (6.6m and 7.1m tall, with a netting tunnel connecting them)
- Junior play equipment
- Climbing nets
- Three trampolines (2 are accessible)
- Accessible spin platform
- Inclusive spinning dish
- A sensory and sound area with 3 accessible musical instruments
- Flying fox with one harness style accessible seat
- Swings (including one basket swing)
- See-saw
- Sand pit with an accessible sand table on the side.
- Three picnic shelters, all with accessible BBQ and tables


"This is a fantastic facility for the community of Bacchus Marsh and surrounds, and even people living in Melbourne or anywhere else in Victoria – it's worth the drive and to there's plenty to do to make a day of it," Moorabool Mayor Cr Ally Munari said.

Meanwhile, in Ballan, construction is underway on the new Ballan Library and Community Hub. Earthworks and excavation work is done and the foundations are being laid.

No smoking or vaping signage

In partnership with our neighbouring councils City of Ballarat and Hepburn Shire and local health providers, Council is supporting an awareness campaign to address the harm from tobacco and vaping.

Council's first action has been to display no smoking or vaping signage at the West Maddingley Early Years Hub, Darley Early Years Hub, Studio 22, Ballan MCH and kindergarten, and Wallace MCH and kindergarten.

The new signage provides clear direction to customers and staff about the restrictions under the legislation applicable to venues where children and young people learn and play.

A small act like keeping batteries out of your bins makes a big impact on Victoria's sustainable future.

When batteries are put in your household bins they can cause fires both in your bins and in the trucks that collect them.

Never put any type of battery in your kerbside bins. Instead, take used batteries to your nearest battery dropoff location so they can be recycled.

All batteries are made up of toxic substances and can pose risks to you, your property and the people who empty your bins. This includes batteries in laptops, mobile phones, cameras, power tools and toys. These hazardous materials pollute the environment when disposed of in landfill.

Recycling used batteries correctly means we can make the most of existing resources and rely less on mining new materials.

Here are some simple suggestions to store your batteries safely at home before taking them to a drop-off:

- Cover the ends of used batteries with duct tape or clear sticky tape, to prevent sparking and reduce the risk of fire
- Store them in a glass container and make sure the container is not airtight
- Don't keep them in metal containers or with other metal objects
- Store them in a cool, dry place away from heat sources
- Keep them away from children and pets.

You can recycle AA, button and rechargeable batteries as well as batteries from cars, laptops, mobile phones, cameras, power tools and electronic toys.

Batteries don't go in household bins

Putting batteries in your bins poses fire risks to your property and to the people who collect your recycling and waste.

Take used batteries to your local drop-off location to keep harmful materials out of your bins and the environment.

The Young Communities Strategy recognises that the holistic development— cognitive, social, emotional and physical—of children and young people starts at birth and extends until the age of 25. A key benefit of this strategic approach is ensuring the needs of the 8-12 years age group are not overlooked.

of tomorrow and values the pivotal role families play in nurturing the wellbeing and connectedness of children and young people. Through the Young Communities Strategy, four key themes of focus were identified:

Council is responsible for the management and maintenance of more than 18,000 urban, rural and reserve trees and is committed to an ongoing program for the planting of street trees throughout the municipality.

Council's plan for street tree planting covers the supply, planting and establishment of the trees across the urban and rural areas within the Shire.

The new plantings are a blend of natives and exotics depending on

Careful planning has been given to the species of trees planted in each area, with consideration of the environment, climate, soil conditions, aesthetic, and the growth of the trees.

Imagine with us


Imagination Magic is an engaging dynamic imagination program delivered specifically for Moorabool children through the Maternal and Child Health Service.

Parallel Wilds

Are you interested in tech that allows us to create a virtual reality?

Are you passionate about the state of the environment and how we can protect threatened species?

Do you have a wild imagination that likes to explore the future?

Parallel Wilds is an immersive and empowering platform featuring creative writing, digital photography and videography, cosplay and modelling, 3D and drone imagery and sound composition. This innovative convergence of art forms allows young people to express their self-identity in the natural world and to create a speculative universe in the future of wilderness, all set in the year 2050.

Moorabool Youth Services have engaged through Parallel Wilds in their Wildland: 2024-2026 series of projects and workshops. The Wildland series encourages young people to investigate the future of a currently threatened native species within the Moorabool landscape. Young people explore and reflect while situated in a local natural landscape and learn about the environment through a biodiversity lens. The educational workshops run over three days in the school holidays, from 2 to 4 October.

The Parallel Wilds program is for young people between the ages of 10-16. Spots are limited so quick registration is essential. Registrations close 30 August.

115th Squadron (Max Durham)

The Moorabool community boasts a rich tapestry of personal narratives steeped in history. Uncover the untold stories of some of the local Moorabool men who took to the skies during World War II. Bob Molesworth served as a Squadron Leader in the RAF leading the No.114 Squadron. In the Second World War, he flew 74 operations and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross by King George IV. Max Durham was posted to the No.115 Squadron in the RAF as Pilot Officer. He flew

a Lancaster bomber plane through 30 missions and received the

Distinguished Flying Cross.
