From butter to bed and breakfast

Wallace flourished in the mid-1800s as a farming settlement, developing a strong dairy industry. The heritage-listed butter factory, though no longer in operation, still stands as a proud reminder of the town's industrious past. History buffs can stay in the renovated former general store, which once served as the post office, bank, and a Sunday meeting place for locals after church.
