

AROUND THE TRAPS

Events are very much a part of our drought response and while many farmers have been busy in the paddocks getting ready for the coming season, nearly 1,000 people

took time out earlier this month to see a huge free fireworks display at Natimuk in the Wimmera.



The fireworks were conducted by students who have been studying with fireworks training provider Fireworks Australia at its Victorian campus based at Clear Lake. The Friday night event attracted an estimated 800 to 1000 people and was felt by one farmer in his tractor several kilometres away.

Spotlight on art and water

Workshops on water, weather, wealth and what to feed

Farmers wanting to start planning now for next summer's water needs are encouraged to dive into Winter Water Month with two workshops in Maryborough and Wedderburn in June.

Agriculture Victoria Drought Operations Coordinator Belinda Pritchard said the Winter Water Month workshops would feature discussions about water, wealth and what to feed your livestock.



Topics would include animal nutrition, water security and seasonal forecasts, with information also available on farm finance and health. The interactive sessions will demonstrate some tools to help farmers prepare for the coming months.

Ms Pritchard said winter was the perfect time to plan for next summer with actions such as water reticulation, feeding systems and feed and water budgeting.

"It's all about building resilience and winter is a great time to undertake strategic planning for the coming season, when the pressures of hand feeding and water carting are not as demanding," she said.

Ms Pritchard said workshop speakers would include experts on seasonal forecasts and climate risk, animal nutrition, farm water management, groundwater, personal health and finance.

"Water security is an important topic we will cover, and this will include discussing securing stock water supplies and the benefits of farm water reticulation," she said.

"After last year's poor Spring, we'll also discuss getting ready for winter feeding and growing lambs – how much feed is required, where it will come from and managing animal nutrition."

Ms Pritchard said the workshops would also feature Agriculture Victoria's Seasonal Risk experts to provide a seasonal outlook.

The Maryborough workshop is on the 1st June and the Wedderburn workshop is on the 21st June. The workshops will be presented by Agriculture Victoria and supported by the Country Fire Authority. Pulses racing as Beans Meanz Art project takes shape

Pulses will be racing as plans for a three metre pulse sculpture takes centre stage during a special open evening at Horsham's Australian Grains Genebank (AGG) on Wednesday 8 June.

The event, which is part of the Art Is...Festival will not only give people a chance to see some of the bank's 150 million seeds, but also discover how crop seeds are being used to create the special art work.

The Beans Meanz Art Project, which is supported by Agriculture Victoria, PB Seeds and Pulse Australia, aims to celebrate the International Year of Pulses in a very artistic way.


It will include a three metre tall sculpture representing a seed and covered with a colourful and diverse array of crop seeds from across Australia.

Farmers who grow these seeds will also be involved in the sculpture's production during a series of community Beans Meanz Art afternoons held across the region.

Agriculture Victoria Regional Drought Coordinator Simone Dalton said the project aimed to combine science, agriculture and art.

"It will double as a drought and art project – warming the farmers' winter with some creativity in local halls as the communities turn four panels on the giant sculpture into the





four seasons.

"The means of telling this story will be thousands of peas, chickpeas, lentils, oats, barley, wheat and, of course, beans.

"People attending our Beans Meanz Art Open Evening on 8 June will get to see a miniature version of the sculpture and hear from artist Glenn Critchley on his design and inspiration so far.

"But that won't be the only story to be told, with Janine Sounness from PB Seeds outlining the amazing tale of the Wimmera's pivotal role in the development of Australia's lentil industry over the past 25 years.

"Janine, who has worked with lentils since 1993, will recount how farmers, breeders and industry participants travelled the world and worked collectively to turn a fledgling industry into a multi-million dollar commercial crop.

"People attending will dine on a meal made with local pules, have a chance to hear from Genebank leader Sally Norton and take a tour the facility, including its giant minus 20 degree freezers."
